SEDJECT: Special Incentives for Satellite Programs

As part of the Special Projects activity of the Air Force, it has been found expedient and effective in particular instances to structure contract incentives for satellite systems primarily on a mission performance basis rather than on those measures which are more conventionally used. It is possible to use these incentives centered on mission performance because of the fact that the systems are expended very shortly after delivery and because the development-procurement cycle is a continuum.

We have now come to the conclusion that it would be in the last interest of the Government to apply these mission performcase interest of the Government to apply these mission performcase interest while we believe that the proposed actions are clearby within the general intent of incentive contracting as outlined for example, there appear to be some provisions or implications in the ASPR which can be interpreted either to prohibit more general use of certain of the proposed incentive features or would require justification and high level review and approval on an individual contract basis.

Details of the proposed incentive structure for satellite projects and the underlying rationale are contained in Attachzent 1. The ASPR provisions which, in greater or lesser degree, appear to prohibit or inhibit application of the proposed incontives are discussed in Attachment 2.

Your approval for the application of the contract incentive surveying described in Attachment 1 to the projects directly managed by the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force (SAFSP),

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anounding cuthority to deviate from such provisions of the ASPA as may be in conflict therewith, is requested.

SUBJECT: Special Incentives for Satellite Programs

Mr. Ignatius' people in OASD(I&L) have informally discussed with our office your memorandum of August 20, 1966, to Mr. Ignatius requesting authority for certain deviations from ASPR in respect to special incentive arrangements. In reviewing this matter we have concluded that the special incentive arrangements would not deviate from ASPR. The Office of the General Counsel concurs, and OSD (I&L) also concurred, informally. Since we understand from SAFSS (Col Worthman) that the only reason for your writing to Mr. Ignatius was that it was possible that an ASPR deviation would be involved in the proposal, it now appears to be unnecessary to involve Mr. Ignatius in this ratter. Consequently, unless you have some objection, CASD (I&L) will not reply to your memorandum of August 20th.

We have some reservation about certain details of the SAFSP proposal, but we will work these out with Colonel Northman (and with SAFSP if necessary) on an informal basis.
