SUBJECT: Security Orientation

Colonel Ford has advised me that it is your desire that a security procedure briefing be scheduled for all personnel assigned to SAFSL. Prior to scheduling a new briefing, I would like to update you on the last presentation, and outline what has been planned for the next briefing.

During the week of 6 January 1969, SAFSL personnel, except yourself, were presented a reindoctrination briefing that included the following points:

Purpose, function and use of the COMINT, TALENT, and BYEMAN security systems.

Similarities of the compartmented systems.

Codeword definition, use and limitations.

Use of the terms NRO, NRP, and MOL within compartmented systems.

Classification and marking of material.

Administration and control procedures.

Personnel security procedures.

Covert concept and methodology.

At the present time the NRP security directives are being revised and updated with some rather significant changes. Since these directives, rather than the BYEMAN manual, govern the conduct of our internal business, I had hoped to schedule a briefing on them for our personnel

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together with a general security briefing once they have been approved and are published. This should be completed within the next two months.

If you desire a briefing schedule other than as stated I will alter or supplant my plans as you wish.


MEMORANDUM FOR  AND COLONEL FORD

I do not agree with the idea of assigning a new man to industry after minimal briefings.
