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INTERDEPARTMENTAL CONTINGENCY PLAN FOR PINWHEEL TRAINING AND

OPERATIONAL FLIGHTS

REF: (See BYE-3092-65 Interdepartmental Contingency Plan

for CAROUSEL Deployment)

I. MISSION

When authorized to conduct operation through the use of OXCART vehicles, obtain high resolution photographic coverage of priority targets in North Vietnam, on the mainland of China and elsewhere in the Far East and Southeast Asia. Also to conduct training flights out of Okinawa.

#### II. OBJECTIVES

- A. To fly these training and operational missions with minimal publicity and to protect the true nature of the mission.
- B. To conceal intelligence community (particularly CIA) participation in the development and utilization of the OXCART (A-12) vehicle.

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C. To conceal the existence of the activity at Area 51.

#### III. GENERAL COVER PLAN

- A. The general cover plan for the presence of the mission aircraft at Kadena is the same as contained in Reference document.
- В. The specific cover story for the pilot in the event of a forced landing in or an ejection over the target country or one of the countries en route will have to be hand-tailored to the particular mission. It is anticipated that the Heads of the Governments of the Philippines, Nationalist China, Thailand and possibly Japan will have been briefed on the OXCART Program prior to initiation of operational missions. Therefore, a landing in or ejection over these countries should pose no great The Commanders of the designated USAF problem. bases in South Korea and South Vietnam will have been previously briefed and an emergency landing in or ejection over one of these countries will be

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a little more difficult to handle than in Thailand or Nationalist China. However, it is felt that this would not pose too great a problem. An emergency landing in or an ejection over Burma, Laos, Cambodia or Japan would be even more difficult to handle and the possibility can not be overlooked. Therefore, the following guidelines will be followed:

#### (PILOT REACTION)

- 1. In the event that the pilot of the mission aircraft is downed over China or North Vietnam,
  he will admit his CIA involvement and appropriate
  operations policy instructions (HD 50-1055-24)
  will apply.
- ejection over The Republic of the Philippines,
  Thailand, Nationalist China, S. Vietnam or
  S. Korea, the mission pilots will seek to be
  placed in communication with a predesignated
  senior USAF official in that country thus while
  not admitting USAF affiliation the implication
  is drawn.

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3. In the event of an emergency landing in or ejection over Japan, Laos, Cambodia or Burma, the pilot will state that he is a Hughes Aircraft Company test pilot who encountered mechanical and/or navigational difficulties while conducting field tests of the aircraft for the United States Air Force.

#### IV. POSSIBLE CONTINGENCIES (OPERATIONAL MISSION)

- A. In the event of the loss of a mission aircraft over North Vietnam and in light of the current military activity there, all inquiries, press and otherwise, will be referred to the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. After appropriate coordination, that office, if pressed, will advise that they have "no comment" to make regarding the incident, and/or it is under investigation.
- B. In the event of the loss of a mission aircraft over South Korea, Japan, South Vietnam, Thailand,

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Laos or Burma while such aircraft was engaged in an operational mission over the China-North Vietnam border area, all inquiries, press or otherwise, will be referred to the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. In the case of an incident involving Cambodia, all inquiries, press or otherwise, will be referred to the Office of the Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs when addressed to military officials and to the Dept. of State when addressed to other U.S. officials. After appropriate coordination, the responsible office will issue a statement that the matter is under investigation and no additional comments will be made for the present. If, in the light of the then present circumstances and political climate, it is deemed appropriate to amplify upon the above statement, a suitable amplification will be worked out by the ICPC.

## (TRAINING MISSION)

C. In the event of the loss of mission aircraft on a training mission out of Okinawa, it is proposed that all inquiries, press or otherwise be referred to the

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Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs. After appropriate coordination, a spokesman for that office will issue a statement similar to that contained in Reference paper, namely that the aircraft in question was an experimental test bed version of a YF-12A and SR-71 family flying out of Okinawa on field tests.

If the accident proves fatal to the pilot and after allowing ample time for the notification of the next of kin, if necessary, a statement may be released by the above mentioned office identifying the pilot and describing him as a test pilot for Hughes Aircraft Company. If the accident is not fatal to the pilot, it is felt that it serves no purpose to identify him at all. In this case, losing a mission aircraft on a training flight out of Okinawa, it is felt appropriate to allow his home base (313th Air Division at Kadena) to issue an identical statement to the one made by the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs.

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In the event of the loss of a mission aircraft D. over the mainland of China all inquiries, press or otherwise, will be referred to the Department of State if directed to diplomatic or civil sources and to the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs if directed to military sources. The ICPC will be convened at the earliest possible time subsequent to the incident in order to evaluate the situation and make recommendations as deemed appropriate to higher authority. Through a properly designated spokesman in the State Department, an announcement will be made to the effect that the matter is under investigation and that no further comment will be made for the present. (If need be, his announcement will be followed up by a statement, either at the Secretary of State or Presidential level, that "No Comment" will be made regarding the incident.)

In this, as well as in the above contingencies, the statements issued, including "No Comment" will

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only be made in response to a direct inquiry and never volunteered.

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On September 12, 1969, the Director, National Reconnaissance Office, addressed a memorandum to members of the Interdepartmental Contingency Planning Committee, wherein, he requested that the below listed contingency plans be immediately updated and that tentative approval of the plans be effected through the CW/AG prior to final review and approval by the ICPC at a later date.

Plans under consideration: SR-71, U-2, 147/154, and Satellite

On October 24, 1969, the ICPC Secretariat disseminated copies of the revised and updated contingency plans to members of the CW/AG for appropriate comment and/or approval. Response from various members indicated a need for a CW/AG meeting for the purpose of reaching a consensus on certain aspects of the plans prior to their submission to the ICPC (See attached responses).

During the CW/AG meeting it was agreed that:

Re: 147/154 Drone, Reconnaissance Program

- a. Paragraph II, <u>MISSION</u>, Lines 6 and 7. Change to read: "Approval for resumption of overflights <u>was</u> granted on October 14, 1969."
- b. Paragraph IV, GENERAL, Line 6, Change to read "Laos" vice "Thailand."
- c. Paragraph V C. Change to reflect DIA briefing of the DAO.

Re: TAGBOARD Contingency Plan

d. The plan would be updated to exclude the OXCART caveat and to reflect the names of new personnel.

Re: IDEALIST/TACKLE Contingency Plan

e. Change the plan by deleting the section on "U.S. denial of knowledge," and by deleting the phrase in Paragraph V B 2 "dates may be cited if necessary."
