MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Labor Relations Problem on the HEXAGON Program

Received a call this A.M. from Mr. McDonald, who asked if it would be possible to obtain the names of the individuals representing Perkin-Elmer and the Turner Construction Company in Danbury the individuals who had disavowed the criticality of the work stoppage. I called Labor Relations, Hq USAF, who passed the request to Labor Relations, AFSC, and to the AFSC field element in Boston.
called me back at 1415 to indicate that the Air Force representative in Boston had reported his conversations of July 31 as follows:
a. With Mr. Clonan (Perkin-Elmer) who indicated when asked about the criticality of the situation, "Not really critical, but annoying."
b. With Mr. Petrie (Chief Engineer, Turner Construction) who, when asked the same question, replied, "The situation isn't at the critical point, but it is bothersome."
I mentioned to that the field representatives of these two concerns might now receive considerable pressure to adjust their positions then contacted his Boston representative to ask that these two officials be queried once again to determine if their "position" had changed. Mr. Clonan was not available and has promised a call back to Mr. Petrie was in New York City and was not expected to return to Danbury today.
I called Mr. McDonald at 1420 and passed this information to him. As a matter of fact, he had his secretary on the line to record it. Mr. McDonald indicated that he planned to contact Perkin-Elmer corporate management and promised a call back by the end of the day to apprise me of developments.

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I pointed out to Mr. McDonald that a rather serious problem was yet to be faced; that even though the negotiations may be successfully completed and agreement between the union and management obtained, we will probably find ourselves in the poistion of having no sheet metal workers to hire since they have in great numbers migrated to New York state, just across the line, and have obtained employment at substantially increased wages.

Mr. McDonald called back at 1515 to report that he had talked with			
Mr. Patrick, Vice President at Perkin-Elmer, and Mr. Clonan to ascertain			
whether or not Mr. Clonan had in fact provided the "not critical, but an-			
noying" advice to the Air Force labor relations people. Mr. Clonan acknowl-			
edged the quote but explained that he had indicated Perkin-Elmer's concern			
over some slippage in the project. After consulting with the Perkin-Elmer			
people, Mr. McDonald urged them to contact again and express			
very clearly the situation as it existed in Perkin-Elmer, that they were			
currently experiencing a day to day slip in the program as a result of the			
work stoppage. Mr. McDonald asked my help in relaying this information			
back through our Air Force channels to			
I called , AFSC, explained the current status, as determined			
from discussions with the Perkin-Elmer corporate representatives, and			
asked that he alert to the call from Perkin-Elmer and further			
that he ask to provide all assistance possible in resolving the			
problem in Danbury. indicated he would. I called Mr. McDonald			
to confirm my action. I asked Mr. McDonald to keep me apprised of further			
developments.
