- 2. The Air Force wholeheartedly believes that achievement of a manned lunar landing is an essential national objective and is convinced that strong Air Force participation, in areas where we have unique experience and capability, is necessary to early success of the program. We are equally convinced that a concurrent vigerous military space program must complement the scientific space exploration endeavors if the total national space program is to be adequate.
- 3. Atlantic Missile Range support of the manned lunar program provides the Air Force a significant epportunity to contribute to the Mational Space Program. The Commander, Atlantic Missile Range, having been commissioned to work jointly with MASA on a lunar program facility support plan, must be informed that MASA will be given full AMR support in accordance with the policies and precedents for accommodation of national missile and space programs on DOD ranges. Other AFSC activities also will be expected to cooperate fully with the MASA. In particular, it is expected that considerable effort will be required by the Space Systems Division in developing various elements of the total program. It is important that this support be in context with total Air Force missile and space responsibilities.
- 4. The scope, complexity and compressed schedule of the lunar program and the inevitable inter-relations between this program and Air Force military space programs, require that participation by Meadquarters USAF and the office of the Secretary of the Air Force be sufficient to insure that Air Force actions provide maximum support to NASA and are consistent with effective execution of the Air Force space program.

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- 5. Accordingly, the Commander of the Atlantic Missile Range and other AFSC suberdinate commanders will be directed to specifically undertake tasks and assignments only when preper instructions are ferthcoming from Air Force Headquarters. They are not to undertake such activities by direction either from MASA or DDR&E and upon receipt of any specific direction from these organisations, they are to refer the matter to Headquarters for clarification. This is not to imply any restraint on communications or information exchange but only with respect to the undertaking of assignments in response to direct requests from any channel other than Air Force Headquarters.
- 6. For your information, Assistant Secretary McMillan has been designated at the Secretarial level as a point of contact with the office, Secretary of Defense on this program.

SUBJECT: Air Force Support of the Mational Space Program

This is in response to your memorandum of 11 July 1961, Reference (c), in response to my memorandum of 6 July 1961, Reference (a), regarding Air Force support of the Mational Space Program. I would also like to formalize certain as-paces of our telephone conversation of 12 July on this subject.

As I indicated to you, the Air Force is most anxious to provide the maximum possible assistance in support of this program. I also pointed out that the size and complexity of the proposed effort, together with its inevitable inter-relation with the military space and missile activities of the Air Force, poses complicated and serious management, priority and planning questions. I am, therefore, for this reason alone, alarmed to Learn in written and cral form of your expressed intent to operate directly with Air Force officers and commanders in the field. You note, for example, in your memorandum that it is your intent that Air Force headquarters will not automatically be involved in the assignment of tasks that you have pisced and propose to place on General Davis. It is our desire that communications and information exchange be as simple, as direct and as effective as possible. I am confident that all elements of the Air Force will seek to cooperate and assist in your present activities to the maximum degree possible. However, I am compolled to reiterate to you that your proposal to give directions and instructions directly from your office to our field commanders is unacceptable. In order that no possible misunderstandings, delays or difficulties be sneountared in the presecution of this

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important activity, I want you to understand electly that our commanders will not accept directions from your office but will refer any such directives or instructions to this Headquerters for guidance. Accordingly, I believe that the whole matter can be greatly expedited if you follow the recommandation in my numerondum of 6 July 1961 and work directly with secretary Medician who can insure that instructions and directions to our commanders are promptly issued in the proper fashion and through proper channels. Simply keeping Secretary Medician informed of your autiens, so stated in your nanoreadom of il July 1961, will be unscooptable.

I must assume that you have misinterpreted or misunderstood Secretary Molemers's guidence to you in regard to this program. You may recall that just this type of question was the resent subject of communications between Secretary McMamera and Chairman Vinson of the Nouse of Representatives Committee on Armed Services. For your information, Chairman Vinson, in his letter, expressed consum shout proposels which allogedly were to penalt civilian Defence assistants to deal directly with officers and divilions in the military departments without first proceeding through the Secretories of the military departments. He further pointed out that there individuals are staff advisors to the Secretary of before and have no command authority. This arrangement appears to be consustant with the philosophy of the Mational Security Act and the objectives of the Free ideat. He further expressed concern lest the Assistant Secretaries of Defense become operators rather than staff assistants to the Secretary of Defense. In his reply, secretary Mellemere made it quite clear that No assistant Secretary of Defense is authorized, or will be authorized, to issue orders to a military department exampl in the menner prescribed by the statute. Then orders are issued by an Assistant Secretary of Defense purminut to a special delegation, they are, and will be, issued through the Secretary of the appropriate military department misss that Ascretary has maned a designee to receive such orders, as the statute provides.

I can only conclude, therefore, that you should seek

further guidance in respect to your proposed method of operation in this program since your proposed to deal directly with, and to issue instructions directly to, our commanders in the field is not only unacceptable to the Air Ferce, but is also in conflict with existing statutes and the Secretary of Defense's explicit statement in this regard.

SUBJECT: National Space Program Facilities Planning

The Department of Defense and NASA are currently engaged in numerous joint planning efforts aimed at establishing the basis for an expanded long range national space program. While finalized plans are contingent upon congressional action and upon the formulation of key technical decisions, it is important that joint planning for all elements of the program, including the extension of ground facilities, be undertaken concurrently.

In coming weeks, NASA and the DoD will outline, as thoroughly as possible, plans for the acquisition of launch facilities, transportation, land, communications and other elements which will be required to support NASA's expanded space effort. Mr. John H. Rubel is working closely with NASA in our joint effort to make certain that forward planning provides for the proper combination and application of NASA and DoD resources in furtherance of this national effort. It will be most helpful if you will insure that the commanders of the national ranges and other officers in charge of major space resources will lond their full support to these planning efforts and will work with Mr. Rubel and NASA management to this end. It is further desired that Major-Qeneral Leighton I. Davis enlist assistance from the commanders of the Pacific Missile Range and the White Sands Missile Range as needed in implementing the planning effort.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF, AIR FORCE

SUBJECT: Management of the Military Space Program

- 1. The Directive of the Secretary of Defense dated 7 March 1961 places a heavy responsibility on the Air Force to manage the major portion of the Defense Department space program. Furthermore, the attainment of the goals which we have outlined in our own five-year space program will place additional burdens which can be overcome only by the most prudent control of our resources and rigid exercising of our executive respons ibilities throughout the life cycle of every space project.
- 2. Consistent with the high priority, exceptional security, the nonoperational aspects of present and future space projects and with proper
 recognition of the high political interest in the overall Defense Department
 space program, the establishment of a Special Space Projects Staff office
 to serve both the Under Secretary and the Chief of Staff appears desirable.
 It will be the purpose of this office to streamline and consolidate the
 various functions of the Air Staff and the Office of the Secretary of the
 Air Force into a single action agency through which will pass all day-to-day
 management and administrative functions of which the Chief of Staff and
 the Secretary have an interest and responsibility. The functions of
 this office will be to: (1) serve as a single point of contact in this



Headquarters on all space matters; (2) prepare appropriate directives on space projects; (3) monitor progress; (4) prepare status reports; (5) control security and public releases and; (6) act as Secretarist for the Air Force Ballistic Missile and Space Committee.

3. Accordingly, with your concurrence, I propose to establish this office immediately and will assign Brigndier General Richard D. Curtin as Director. If you concur in this arrangement, I urge that you so inform the Air Staff in order that each Deputy Chief of Staff can establish a single point of contact to work with this office on all space matters of mutual interest. I would further suggest that you advise the Commander of the Air Force Systems Command that he is authorised direct contact with the Space Projects Staff office and to set up policies, procedures, and other arrangements to insure effective and prompt support of the Air Force directed space projects.

Dear Bennie

As you know, the stiainment of our short and long range goals in space depends very heavily on our ability to streamline our management channels and reduce the review and peripheral control of approved space projects to the essential minimum. I have discussed this matter at length with Dr. Charyk and we both conclude that the Air Force stands to benefit if we reshape our Hendquarters organizations and functions in a manner similar to the arrangements originally used on the ballistic missile program. I have agreed, therefore, to the establishment of an office attached directly to the Under Secretary, to serve as the single point of contact on all space matters for both management and staff matters. This office, the Space Projects Staff office, will serve in the dual role as an action agency for the Under Secretary, and will keep me, as well as key members of the Air Staff, fully informed on space activities. It will also not as secretarist for the Ballistic Missile and Space Committee. Brigadier General Curtin will function as Director of this office.

Dear Dr. Charyk;

Management of our USAF space programs has been frought with many extremely difficult problems for a variety of reasons. You are thoroughly familiar with those reasons, and your actions during the past months have been instrumental in firmly establishing the USAF role in space as well as allowinting to a great extent the management problems at this level.

A number of problems still exist which can only be received by actions at higher levels. Nevertheless, one item of considerable concern to me can be received at your level. This pertains to SAMOS and its relation to other space programs. I fully understand the researce for the current arrangement and fully support it. However, from an APSC management and recourse standpoint, it is impossible to isolate SAMOS from the other space programs. Only by being fully informed on SAMOS planning and status can I assure its complete and timely Command support and properly accommodate its impact on related programs.

In the past, I have an numerous occasions been embarraceed by situations created primarily through lack of communication. To correct this situation, I have established a Directorate of Space Programs which organizationally is assigned to Colonel Glasser. Colonel Redney Nudemberg is its chief. In order that the maximum benefits be derived from this arrangement, it is suggested that you approve and sign a directive which establishes policies and procedures. A suggested version of this directive is attached.

MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES FOR SAMOS (AFSC)

1. General

The Secretary of the Air Force Orders 115-1 and 116-1, deted 31 August 1960, prescribe over-all policies, responsibilities, and relationships for system management of SAMOS within the Air Force. These orders were issued in recognition of the need for streemlined administration and special management emphasis on a high priority program of National importance. These orders established the Office of Missile and Satallite Systems in the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force to assist him in discharging his responsibility for the direct supervision and central of the SAMOS Project. The Director of this office is responsible for maintaining Melson with the Office of the Secretary of Defense and other interested government agencies on matters relative to his assigned responsibilities. The orders also established a Directorate of the SAMOS Project at El Segundo, California as a field expansion of the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force responsible to and reporting directly to the Secretary for Management of the SAMOS Project.

By Headquarters USAF letter of 14 October 1960, subject, "Missiles and Satellite Systems," all major commands were notified of implementation of the

SAF enders redecessed above. This latter stated that "However, in order to maintain general project knowledge within those command or staff effices where such knowledge is necessary for program support or coordination of related matters, need-to-know brieflags will be given on a periodic basis.

---Requests for brieflags will be directed to the Secretary of the Air Force and will be approved on a strict need-to-know basis. " The Commander AFSG, for reasons indicated in paragraph 2 below, has a requirement for more timely and more detailed information pertaining to the SAMOS program. The purpose of this PME is to establish better communication channels between the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force, the Director of the SAMOS Project, and the Commander of AFSG.

2. Management Concept.

The Commander AFSC, among other things, is charged with the responsibility of managing all aspects of Air Perce weepen system programs through system acquisition. In order to accomplish this assigned responsibility, the Commander AFSC must have detailed knowledge of every program which affects AFSC resources. Detailed and timely knowledge of the SAMOS program will enable AFSC to better provide support to that program and, in turn, seciety the requirements of other AFSC assigned responsibilities.

3. Instructions.

The Commander AFSC and designated personnel within his Directorate of Space Programs (SCON), subject to individual approval by the Office of the

Secretary of the Air Porce, will be cleared for the SAMOS program.

These personnel will be authorized to dispuse the SAMOS program with appropriate personnel from SAFMS and SAFSP. They will be hept informed on program planning and states. The Commander AFSC will inform the Office of the Secretary of the Air Porce on all matters under his jurisdiction which may have a bearing on the SAMOS program or in turn where the SAMOS program affects other AFSC responsibilities.

The Commander APSC is, Serther, entherized to establish a linion officer at SAFMS and SAFSP to heep him informed, on a timely basis, of the serrout status of the SAMOS program.

4 Procedures.

The Commander AFSC is authorized to establish a SAMOS effice reporting directly to the Commander which will have the following fanglisms:

- a. Participation in the formulation of the SAMOS Development Flan to insure adequate resource planning and proparation of recommendations for the Commender APSC to the Under Secretary on the feasibility of the plan from a support point of view.
- h. Coordinate all space matters assigned to AFSC to insure that estions and resources on all space programs are in consentace with policies and management decisions made with respect to the SAMOS Project and the National Space Program.
- e. Expedits support requirements received from the Directorate of the SAMOS Project and propose instructions for the Commander APSC to the

appropriate elements of AFSC for the implementation of the approved SAMOS Development Plan where support to required.

d. Keep the Commander APSC informed as to the status of the SAMOS Project so that he can initiate timely action in support of SAMOS to insure its successful accomplishment.

5. Communications and Reporting.

The Commender AFSC, in the execution of the provisions of this Program Management Instruction, will be placed into the SAMOS communications channel with the Office of Missile and Sacellite Systems and the Director of the SAMOS Project. Seems communications facilities for this purpose have been initiated.

SUBJECT: AFSC Participation in the SAMOS Program

TO:

SCG (General Schriever)

- 1. To assist you in your forthcoming discussion with General Curtin on the above subject, the following information is offered.
- 2. In August 1960, the Secretary of the Air Force directed that special management procedures be established for streamlining the SAMOS program since it was a high priority program of National importance and to protect against undue and extraneous publicity. As you know this management procedure has created certain hardships upon the management of your R&D resources. Since that time information to this Command on SAMOS has been in the form of very minor bits and pieces. A program of the magnitude of this project has definite impacts and serious effects upon this Command's over-all R&D effort, particularly in the area of resources such as range support, launch scheduling, and over-all space and ballistic missile activities. In order to eliminate serious AFSC resource management, priority, and planning problems we must immediately establish a SAMOS need-to-know for a limited number of AFSC people.
- When this need-to-know has been established a detailed briefing, preferably on the West Coast, must be arranged. The briefing should be given by the Director of the SAMOS project office to yourself and other appropriate AFSC personnel. It should give some background information to fill the void from September 1960 through the date of the briefing. In addition, present status and future planning must be presented. In the establishment of a need-to-know it must be emphasized that this Command has at its disposal vast R&D resources that can and should be utilized to better support the SAMOS program and that this Command is charged with the accomplishment of many R&D projects. These projects are all encompassing, running the gamut from applied research and air breathing aeronautical systems, through ballistic missile and space systems. Detailed knowledge of all R&D programs is required if you are to properly manage your existing and planned resources. Further, these resources can be put at the disposal of the SAMOS project director. Scheduling of such resources as laboratory work and wind tunnel testing can be more advantageously arranged. Additionally, technological advances made within the SAMOS program have, in some cases, direct application to proposed future space systems. Application to future systems is a savings in both money and time. Recent events have pointed up the urgency to reduce time schedules by every means





available. An example of the application of SAMOS technological knowledge to future systems is SR-178, the manned reconnaissance satellite proposal.

- 4. AFSC must have an active participation in such things as the formulation of program direction, planning, manpower, and facilities requirements, not from a directing concept but for informational purposes to better manage our resources. Such management tools as the development plan and changes thereto must be placed at our disposal. We must be permitted to attend scheduled meetings and briefings if it is determined that actions resulting from such meetings have an impact on the accomplishment of our assigned mission. AFSC must be included as an information addressee on all correspondence, such as messages, letters and documents originating from SAFMS and SAFSP. We must, further, be permitted to discuss details of the SAMOS program directly with personnel of SAFMS, SAFSP and the involved contractor, if required.
- 5. Also, it is suggested that an AFSC Liaison Office be established at both SAFMS and SAFSP to keep this headquarters informed on a daily basis, if required, of changes, status and other details of the program. These liaison offices could be manned by one officer each but must have complete access to information.
- 6. AFSC Field Commanders should be advised to inform this headquarters immediately of all requests placed upon them by SAF for the use of their facilities and other AFSC resources associated with the SAMOS program.
- 7. In order to implement the above required actions, it is suggested that subsequent to your discussion with General Curtin, this office prepare a suggested directive in draft form, from the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force to AFSC implementing these actions. A letter of transmittal to the Under Secretary, with a copy for the Chief of Staff, would accompany the proposed directive outlining in detail the requirement and requesting an audience for discussion of the problem and proposed directive. 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SUBJECT: AFSC Participation in the SANOS Program

TO: SCG (General Schriever)

- 1. To assist you in your forthcoming discussion with General Curtin on the above subject, the following information is offered.
- 2. In August 1960, the Secretary of the Air Force directed that special management procedures be established for strumining the SANOS program since it was a high priority program of National importance and to protect against undue and extraneous publicity. As you know this management procedure has created certain hardships upon the management of your RED resources. Since that time information to this Command on SANOS has been in the form of very minor bits and pieces. A program of the magnitude of this project has definite impacts and serious effects upon this Command's over-all RED effort, particularly in the area of resources such as range support, launch schoduling, and over-all space and ballistic missile activities. In order to eliminate serious APSC resource management, priority, and planning problems we must immediately establish a SANOS need-to-knew for a limited number of APSC people.
- 3. When this need-to-know has been established a detailed briefing, preferably on the West Coast, must be arranged. The briefing should be given by the Director of the SANOS project office to yourself and other appropriate APSC personnel. It should give some background information to fill the void from September 1960 through the date of the briefing. In addition, present status and future planning must be presented. In the establishment of a mod-to-know it must be emphasized that this Command has at its disposal wast R&D resources that can and should be utilized to better support the SAMOS program and that this Command is charged with the accomplishment of many RaD projects. These projects are all encompassing, running the gamut from applied research and air breathing aeronautical systems, through ballistic missile and space systems. Detailed knowledge of all RaD programs is required if you are to properly manage your existing and planned resources. Further, these resources can be put at the disposal of the SANOS project director. Scheduling of such resources as laboratory work and wind tunnel testing can be more advantageously arranged. Additionally, technological advances made within the SANOS program have, in some cases, direct application to proposed future space systems. Application to future systems is a savings in both money and time. Recent events have pointed up the urgency to reduce time schedules by every means

available. An example of the application of SAMOS technological knowledge to future systems is SR-178, the manned reconnaissance satellite proposal.

- 4. AFSC must have an active participation in such things as the formulation of program direction, planning, manpower, and facilities requirements, not from a directing concept but for informational purposes to better manage our resources. Such management tools as the development plan and changes thereto must be placed at our disposal. We must be permitted to attend scheduled meetings and briefings if it is determined that actions resulting from such meetings have an impact on the accomplishment of our assigned mission. AFSC must be included as an information addressee on all correspondence, such as messages, letters and documents originating from SAFMS and SAFSP. We must, further, be permitted to discuss details of the SAMOS program directly with personnel of SAFMS, SAFSP and the involved contractor, if required.
- 5. Also, it is suggested that an AFSC Liaison Office be established at both SAFMS and SAFSF to keep this headquarters informed on a daily basis, if required, of changes, status and other details of the program. These liaison offices could be manned by one efficer each but must have complete access to information.
- 6. AFSC Field Commanders should be advised to inform this headquarters immediately of all requests placed upon them by SAF for the use of their facilities and other AFSC resources associated with the SAMOS program.
- 7. In order to implement the above required actions, it is suggested that subsequent to your discussion with General Curtin, this office prepare a suggested directive in draft form, from the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force to AFSC implementing these actions. A letter of transmittal to the Under Secretary, with a copy for the Chief of Staff, would accompany the proposed directive outlining in detail the requirement and requesting an audience for discussion of the problem and proposed directive. A talking draft of a SAF PMI is attached.

MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES FOR SAMOS (AFSC)

1. General.

The Secretary of the Air Force Orders 115-1 and 116-1, dated 31 August 1960 prescribe over-all policies, responsibilities, and relationships for system management of SAMOS within the Air Force. These orders were issued in recognition of the need for streamlised administration and special management emphasis on a high priority program of Mational importance and to protect against undue and extraneous publicity. These orders established the Office of Miseile and Satellite Systems in the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force to assist him in discharging his responsibility for the direct supervision and control of the SAMOS Project. The Director of this office is responsible for maintaining liaison with the Office of the Secretary of Defense and other interested government agencies on matters relative to his assigned responsibilities. The orders also established a Directorate of the SAMOS Project at El Segundo, California as a field extension of the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force responsible to and reporting directly to the Secretary for Management of the SAMOS Project.

By Headquarters USAF letter of 14 October 1960, subject, "Missiles and Satellite Systems" all major commands were notified of implementation of the SAF orders above referenced. This letter stated that "However, in order to maintain general project knowledge within those command or staff offices where such knowledge is necessary for program support or coordination of related matters, need-to-know briefings will be given on a periodic basis. ---Requests for briefings will be directed to the Secretary of the Air Force and will be approved on a strict need-to-know basis." These personnel will be cleared to discuss freely all aspects of that program with personnel from SAFMS and SAFSF and are to be kept advised of changes to the program when in the initial planning stages and as they develop. Authorization is granted for these personnel to discuss the SAMOS project with involved contractors provided (individual) prior

approval has been granted by the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force.

The Office of the Secretary of the Air Force will establish the proper clearances for the AFSC designated personnel and will accordingly notify SAFMS and SAFSP. Headquarters AFSC will inform the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force of all contacts, actions, conflicts, potential problems and other items which may or are impairing either the SAMOS program or the Commander AFSC's assigned responsibilities.

The Commander AFSC is, further, authorized to establish a liaison officer at SAFMS and SAFSP to keep him informed, on a timely basis, of the current status of the SAMOS program.

4. Procedures

The Commander AFSC is authorized to establish a SAMOS office reporting directly to the Commander which will have the following functions:

- a. Review and participation in the formulation of the SAMOS Development
 Plan for adequate resource planning and preparation of recommendations
 for the Commander AFSC to the Under Secretary on the feasibility of the
 plan from a support point of view.
